Recommendation

That the tax adjustments outlined in Appendix 1 attached to the report dated September 8, 2015 from the Commissioner of Corporate Services and Chief Financial Officer for applications to adjust taxes pursuant to Sections 334, 357, 358 and 359 of the *Municipal Act*, be adopted.

Background

Sections 334, 357 and 358 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c.25 allow a property owner or the Treasurer to make an application for the cancellation, reduction or refund of taxes for a number of specific reasons. Taxes may be adjusted when a building has been demolished or razed by fire or if a property has become exempt, changed class or has been overcharged by reason of gross or manifest error.

Section 359 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25 allows the Treasurer to make an application for an increase in taxes levied where taxes have been undercharged due to a gross or manifest error that is a clerical or factual error, but not an error in judgement in assessing the land.

Comments

Section 334, 357 and 358 Tax Adjustments

A total of 68 applications for Section 334, 357 and 358 tax adjustments have been prepared for Council's consideration. The total cancellation or refund of taxes as recommended is \$619,672.94. Appendix 1 outlines the tax cancellations being recommended by property and summarizes by appeal reason the number of applications and tax dollars recommended for reduction.

Section 359 Tax Adjustment

An error in the assessment of 5337 Ninth Line has resulted in the taxes for the property being incorrect. Due to clerical errors, the assessment value in the commercial tax class was excluded from the 2014 taxation year. Section 359 of the *Municipal Act* allows a municipality to correct the taxes for the current and/or previous year. The total increase of taxes recommended is \$258.66.

A combined total of 69 applications for tax adjustments have been prepared for Council's consideration. The net tax adjustment as recommended is a cancellation of \$619,414.28.

Financial Impact


The City's portion of the tax adjustments resulting from the Section 334, 357, 358 and 359 tax appeals is \$78,458.59.

Conclusion

Tax appeals for 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 taxation years are listed in Appendix 1. The *Municipal Act* requires Council to approve the tax adjustments.

Appointment of Screening Officers for Administrative Penalties System

Recommendation

That a by-law be enacted to repeal By-law 0206-2014, and to appoint Screening Officers for the Administrative Penalties System, as outlined in the report from the Commissioner of Corporate Services and Chief Financial Officer, dated September 14, 2015.

Background

The *Municipal Act*, 2001, authorizes municipalities to implement an Administrative Penalties System (APS) for non-compliance with any by-laws respecting licensing and parking. Ontario Regulation 333/07, under the *Municipal Act*, 2001 allows municipalities to establish an APS for administering, disputing and resolving most minor parking offences as an alternative to the current system of parking tickets being processed.

At its meeting of September 10, 2014 Council approved a recommendation to repeal By-laws 0286-2013 and 0103-2014 and enacted by-law 0206-2014 to appoint Screening Officers for the Administrative Penalties System as outlined in the report from the Commissioner of Corporate Services and Chief Financial Officer, dated August 26, 2014.

On September 10, 2014, Council adopted By-law 0206-2014, which appointed the Manager of Court Administration, the Supervisors of Court Administration and four additional staff person as Screening Officers, to ensure that resources exist to respond to public requests for review of an administrative penalty. Since the enactment of By-law 0206-2014 one of the screening officers position has become vacant. As a result of staffing changes one staff person has been recruited to fill the vacancy and perform the duties of Screening Officer. The By-law must be revised to reflect the changes in the appointment of personnel authorized to respond to public requests for review of an administrative penalty, and the following additional staff appointed as Screening Officer:



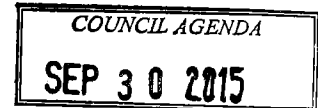

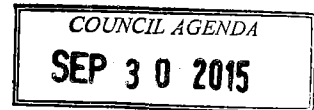

Background to a Petition Against the April 27, 2015 Changes to MiWay Routes 4 and 38 at Huron Park.

COUNCIL AGENDA

SEP 30 2015

Over seventy area residents signed a petition against round the clock use of Huron Park as a Bus Layover Terminal for Routes 4 and 38 due to:

1) Increased Traffic Volume: Route 38 which served Trillium Hospital has been relocated to Huron Park. Starting at 5:00 am, it runs 20 hours a day, seven days a week. To allow Trillium visitors to transfer to Route 4 from Route 38, Route 4 now has increased frequency and a new Sunday service. Both Routes turnaround in Huron Park using Paisley Boulevard West to enter and exit. Combined "in and out" bus transits at Huron Park are 17 per hour at rush hour, 8 per hour in the evening. **On average a bus now enters or exits Huron Park every 5 minutes at a rate of 12 per hour, more than double the previous Route 4 rate plus an additional 4 hours each day and all day on Sundays.**

2) Safety and Greenspace Degradation: Bus traffic through Huron Park arrives and departs through the Saint Jerome School 40kph zone. Inside Huron Park the route passes close to a children's splash pad, a family picnic area, busy parking lot and a children's play area. The narrow road has sharp turns, no posted speed limit, two bicycle lanes, limited access to sidewalks and no crosswalks. Bus traffic is forced to use the bicycle lanes when negotiating turns putting passengers and drivers at risk and compromising the safety of other park users, particularly children and cyclists. **Using Huron Park as a high volume bus turnaround and layover terminal seriously degrades the integrity and safe enjoyment of this valuable public green space.**

3) Increased Noise: Buses on layover in Huron Park with engines idling have been identified by MiWay as problematic even when in compliance with Mississauga Noise Bylaws. Bus acceleration and deceleration is significantly noisier than idling and also very upsetting to area residents particularly at night and in the early morning hours.

Requested Remedies:

a) Remove Route 38 from Huron Park.

b) Remove either 4E or 4W buses from Huron Park

Dear Mr Tovey

The time has come for Mississauga to reflect what is being done for trees in other jurisdictions. To highlight our lack of foresight with respect to the environment Toronto has a 30-40% tree canopy and tree protection in place as well as Oakville, Richmond Hill and the Niagara region to name a few. Mississauga has a 15% tree canopy and no tree protection – this is unacceptable. Ward 1 is home to original Carolinian forest oaks and maples, many of which are over a hundred years old. Sadly, in the last 20-30 years, a city employee in the forestry department stated that the tree canopy in south Mississauga has been reduced by over 50%. In addition, we have recently lost countless numbers of ash trees which further augments the need to preserve our healthy trees. The bylaws that currently exist enable developers to proceed without any concern for the fate of centuries-old oaks and maples in particular.

Developers need to build more responsibly according to bylaws which you introduce and enforce protecting the natural landscape of this sensitive region. The size and age of trees is not taken into enough consideration when permits have been issued in the past. Planting saplings to replace giant oaks and maples is laughable.

Your favourable reaction to these concerns will have a huge impact on the future of south Mississauga.

A memo was presented to Council addressed to Councillor Tovey and Mississauga Councillor Members, dated May 26th, 2015. The following are responses to the questions raised regarding the City of Mississauga's Private Tree Protection Bylaw:

1. *Does Mississauga have a bylaw regulating the cutting of mature trees on residential properties?*
The City of Mississauga's Private Tree Protection By-law (0254-2012) regulates the removal of 3 or more trees, over 15cm (6 inches) in diameter per calendar year..

As a condition of the permit process, all landowners are required to replace each healthy tree removed. Prior to the approval of a permit, a Replacement Tree Security Deposit is collected for each healthy tree identified for removal and is returned after the replacement planting of those trees has occurred and been verified. Trees under 50cm (20in) require 1 replacement tree each, whereas trees over 50cm (20in) require 2 replacement trees each.

If trees are identified as dead, dying or hazardous, residents can remove three or more over 15cm (6 inches) in diameter but it must be approved through the permit process. Associated permit fees are waived and replacement trees are not required.

Whether you are a homeowner, a business owner or a developer wishing to remove trees from private property, you must comply with the private tree protection bylaw.

2. *If no, will Mississauga Council introduce and enforce such a bylaw?*
The City of Mississauga's Private Tree Protection By-law (0254-2012) was revised and effective as of March 2013.
3. *If yes, why is the enforcement of the bylaw apparently lax or non-existent? On enquiry, we have found that property owners have no difficulty getting a building permit for renovations or complete redevelopment, regardless of the number of mature trees to be cut down.*
The City of Mississauga makes every attempt to preserve trees during the planning process. The inclusion of trees in the initial stage of planning is a vital component that will determine if trees will be preserved or are required to be removed. The planning act supersedes the private tree bylaw. The buildable envelope as set out in the planning act allows for an area of the lot to be developed. The bylaw cannot stop trees from being remove that are in conflict with the buildable envelope as set out in the planning act. With that said, both planning and forestry staff make every effort to ensure that trees are protected, preserved and in cases that can't be the case, replanted through planning applications.

Mississauga's urban forest is a valuable asset: with over 2 million trees located on public and private land, the urban forest within the City was reassessed in 2014 as being 19% canopy cover City wide. The City of Mississauga's Tree Protection bylaw protects and enhances Mississauga's existing tree cover while respecting a landowner's right to make changes to the landscape of their property in an environmentally responsible manner.
