This lovely afternoon meet is where I met a number of women, all poets, many published in local anthologies, all with their own tricks of the trade that a young poet like me was ecstatic to soak up in what felt like a short three hours. Here I was able to meet Anna Yin, not only an amazing poet, but also Mississauga's first ever Poetry Laureate; Norma Nicholson, a local published author of Young Lives on the Line; Cheryl Antao-Xavier, publisher and Executive Director of RISE up! Rise ABOVE! a non-profit corporation whose mission is to bring about empowerment through creativity; as well as many other poets who all helped to create a safe environment for poetry reading and learning.

The meet up was nothing short of amazing, and opened my eyes to the opportunities available for poets in our growing city. Sometimes all you need to achieve greatness is step out of your comfort zone, which is all it took for me to earn the respect of all these established writers.
