## Honors to 13 citizens MISSISSAUGA LIBRARY SYSTEM for special efforts

Thirteen Mississauga citizens will receive prestigious Bicentennial awards for exemplary volunteer work in the community.

The Mississaugans — four women and nine men — are among 1,984 Ontario residents who will receive special gold-plated award medals at ceremonies across the province this fall.

During her trip to Canada this fall, Queen Elizabeth will be presented with a solid gold replica of the volunteers' Bicentennial medal. The official announcement of the award-winners will be made in August.

Jeffery (Ed) Armstrong was inducted into the Mississauga Hockey Hall of Fame in 1980, the same year he was voted "Mississauga's Greatest Contributor to Minor Sports," says his Bicentennial award nomination form. From 1960 to 1975 he was a member of the executive of the Malton Minor Hockey Association and now serves as

treasurer of both the Mississauga Hockey League and the Malton Baseball Association.

The Beverley St. resident was a leader with the 2nd Malton Cubs and Scouts for more than 15 years, is active on the board of Trinity United Church in Malton, and helped reorganize a then-defunct Malton Fastball League, serving as league president from 1965-71. Away from the rink, Armstrong managed baseball and lacrosse teams and umpired ball games through the summer season. . . .
