Club star will follow mentor

The longest serving swim coach in Ontario was fired by the Mississauga Aquatic Club (TOMAC) this week.

Bill Barton, who has trained TOMAC senior swimmers for 13 years, re-

ceived the word suddenly on Tuesday morning by the president of the club, Mike Quinton. Barton had just returned from a two-week stint in Europe with Dean Kondziolka, the best swimmer TOMAC has and one of Canada's rising stars on the international scene. On Thursday, Barton said, "I was given no notice at all. But it's their club and they can hire and fire as they please. They just decided


to exercise their option." Barton was given no reason for the firing, and said he feels his longevity with the club should earn him at least an explanation. But Quinton refused to discuss the firing.

Quinton told The News, "I really can't talk ■about it. I'm not going to engage in a public

discussion of what we consider a private matter." Barton's main concern now is what's going to happen to the 14 kids he's leaving behind with the club. Quinton admitted the club doesn't have an outside replacement for Barton, but he said, "there are plenty of coaches

When asked his opinion. Kondziolka said, "The club didn't consider the future of the 14 swimmers now with Barton.

coach than Barton anyway, but even if they do it won't be right now, in the middle of the season."

All that is left now is a settlement on the contract Barton has with the club. It runs until September 1992, but it includes a clause that allows the club to terminate it with six months notice. The two parties are now working on a severance settlement.
