She is one of six children born to Benjamin and Ida Shaw Lynd, both born in Port Credit. Benjamin Lynd was born in 1842, in the Government House which stood on the east side of the Credit River, where the Port Credit Yacht Club now stands.

Ida Lynd married Arthur George Bradley, an engineer from St. Catherines on August 24, 1910 in her parents' home in Port Credit. Mr. Bradley was the manager of the Port Credit Brick Company, which operated where the Texaco Plant now stands. Two

children were born, a son, Arthur Lynd, and a daughter, Lois Betty.

Mrs. Bradley is still an avid photographer. Her home and cottage are carpeted with her own braided rugs and she crochets tablecloths for all the grandchildren.

Mrs. Bradley continues to drive her car, is a subscriber to both the O'Keefe Centre and the Massey Hall Concerts. She loves the opera, an interest which stems from her piano teaching days as a young adult.
