Burrowes, 75, said it was a total surprise to find out she was the winner considering she wasn't even aware she had been nominated.

"I was practically hyperventilating when I found out," said the affable Burrowes, a retired medical technologist. "I just couldn't believe it. My husband knew I had been nom-

inated but he didn't say a word."

Her list of accomplishments and work in the community is long and impressive. She's the co-founder and former chair of the Malton Community Festival, sat on Malton Neighbourhood Services board of directors for six years, volunteers at Holy Cross Catholic Elementary School where she is heavily
