gardening, sewing, and reading.
"I like to read facts," she said.
"Current issues, helpful hints, things that are character-building. When you read, you are feeding yourself."

Typical reading material includes the newspaper, and the Bible, which she said always offers something appropriate to her life.

Religion plays a big part in the Courtneys' lives. For the past two years Courtney has taught Sunday school at the Korean Church, where she and her husband are also youth leaders.
