City artist's 'simple classic' design appears on silver dollar

Canada's newest legal tender, a 1984 silver dollar, is dedicated to Toronto's 150th birthday, and the design on the reverse side of the coin was created by a Mississauga resident.

David Craig, a 39-year-old illustrator and part-time teacher at Sheridan College, was one of 60 artists from across the country who submitted designs for the new silver dollar.

The search for the design began early last year, with the selection of the coin theme. Ten or 12 themes were presented for consideration to the Master of the Mint and the Royal Cana-dian Mint board of directors. The theme chosen by the group was then offered to Cabinet for approval.
With Cabinet approval, the call was some out to Canadian

sent out to Canadian artists from every province to submit designs. A list of designers invited to present work is recommended by national museums and tional museums and

art galleries.
When all the designs are received, they are allotted a number and checked to make sure they bear no identifica-tion. The select committee then begins the task of choosing

the task of choosing the winning design.

"Initially, I considered scores of different ideas," said Craig. "But finally, I realized that what would work best would be simple, classic themes— a classic themes - a place of meeting, fur

trading, a shape to represent Toronto."

The coin's foreground depicts an Indian paddling a canoe across Lake Ontario, a reminder of the Indian origin of Toronto. In the Toronto.

Roval Canadian Mint's meticulous engraving highlights the Toronto skyline, and even the minute details, such as in-dividual panes of glass, have been carefully reproduc-

"The skyline with the CN Tower was the obvious yet pleasing shape, and a lone Indian in a canoe symbolized the fur trade," explained Craig. "I think this combination · shapes works well and produces a design of sufficient clarity and classic simplicity to appear on a coin," he added.

The artist's works have included it

have included illustrations for books and magazine covers, the cover of the 1983 Canadian Football League programs, the Molson's Tennis Challenge poster and Alberta's 75th Anniversary poster. The 1984 silver dollar is the first coin he has

designed.

The coin, which is 50 per cent fine silver, and 50 per cent copper, is available by mail order from the Royal Canadian Mint and through numismatic dealers.
