Two will be honored

Two Mississauga residents have been named to the Order of Canada.

The two, Gregory Anaka and Roy Ivor will be invested to the Order in Ottawa sometime this spring.

Mr. Anaka, a longtime resident of Michland Ave., Malton, will receive the honor on recognition of his tireless community involvement.

Fourteen years ago Mr. Anaka moved to Malton and seven years later retired from the Royal Canadian Air Force.

During his life in Malton he became involved in community affairs.

He is now a member of the Mississauga recreation committee and community centre board.

Mr. Anaka also played a major role in promoting the interest and fund raising for the Malton Arena.

Roy Ivor, probably the most famous Mississauga resident, received a letter from the Secretary General of the Order of Canada informing him of

his appointment.

Mr. Ivor received international recognition for his work with birds at his Winding Lane Bird Sanctuary on Mississauga Rd.

The letter, addressed to Dr. Roy Ivor, because he had received a doctor of science degree from the

University of Windsor last year, was made public Saturday.

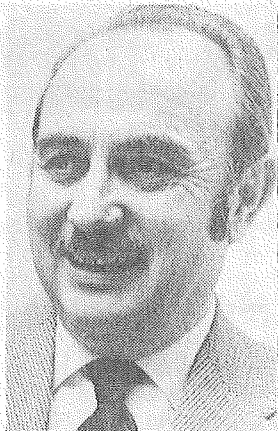
The letter stated, "I have been instructed by his excellency Roland Michener, Chancellor and companion of the Order of Canada to inform you of your appointment as a member of the Order."

The letter was signed by Esmond Butler, Secretary-General, of the Order of Canada.

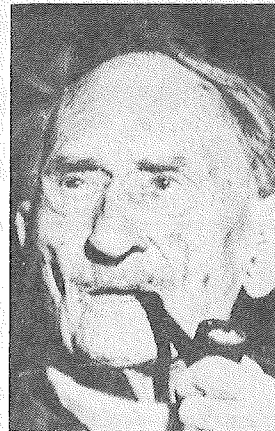
Both appointments were published in the Canada Gazette Saturday and were distributed across the country.
