A testimonial dinner honoring Mississauga developer Iggly Kaneff on the occasion of the 25th, anniversary of his arrival in Canada as an immigrant, established two \$1,000 a year scholarships in Kaneff's name at Erindale College.

More than 100 persons attended Kaneff's testimonial \$150 a plate dinner at the Mississauga Golf and Country Club, the proceeds of which went to the scholarships.

Kaneff arrived in Ontario from Bulgaria in 1952 with approximately \$5 in his pocket. Today he has 12 highrise buildings with his name on them, and has built hundreds of homes in Mississauga.

Asked how much he was worth, Kaneff replied, "I don't know lots."

Guest speaker Premier Bill Davis said, "Most who seek their fortunes do come to Ontario and I only have 33 years of Progressive Conservative Government to back that up.'

Davis said if you work hard enough, you can achieve almost anything.

Also speaking were Gordon S. Shipp, Shipp Corporation; Michael Weir, Q.C., Weir and Markson; George Kern, president, Danhei Construction Ltd.; Mississauga MP Tony Abbott,; and Erindale College principal, E.A. Robinson.

Shipp, for whom Kaneff worked as a

carpenter when he first came to the area, said, "You know how Iggy is – he can bluff his way through anything."

His monuments, Abbott said, "stand as a testimonial to his achievements. He has come here and left a lasting monument,"

The two scholarships established, which Kaneff said he would try "to continue forever,"

are for a third and fourth year student in Urban Studies.

They will be presented on June 15 for the first time

Kaneff was rather choked up by the praise, and could only say, "I sooner than cry

talking tonight — if was a great surprise."


"At no previous time has financial support been as important," Dr. Robinson said in thanking Kaneff.
