## Citizen Kennedy keeps CVC post

For the first time since he became an ordinary citizen, Harold Kennedy has been elected to something.

The recently retired city councillor was re-elected to the Credit Valley Conservation last week in voting at a regional council meeting. Kennedy's success came despite the fact he isn't technically eligible for the post.

Two years ago councillors had a spirited debate, led by Mississauga's representatives, which resulted in a policy that only regional councillors would be appointed to special purpose bodies such as the conservation authority. Misisssauga councillors have often argued in the past that only politicians should be on such bodies because they are directly accountable to the public.

The resolution had a "default" clause, however, which stated that if no councillor was willing to serve, then area municipalities would be asked for recommendations.

Mississauga is entitled to five representatives on the authority and six councillors initially indicated they wanted to serve on the body.

Councillors Carmen Corbasson and Katie Mahoney withdrew their names at the council meeting so that city council's slate — selected the day before — could be elected. That means Kennedy will become the first non-politician in some time to represent the City on the authority.

He is the current chairman of the authority and has sat on it for 20 years, taking a keen interest in its activities, especially the development of the Mississauga waterfront and Lakefront Promenade Park. Kennedy also sat on the Metro Toronto Authority for the first six years of his politi-



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cal career.

Also selected to sit on the authority were incumbent members David Culham, Frank Dale, Pat Mullin and Pat Saito.

Peel council made a number of other appointments to outside agencies yesterday, as well as approving membership on its own committees.

There will be three new council representatives on the Peel Distric Health Council, which helps determine how health dollars are spent here. Carmen Corbasson of Mississauga,

Gael Miles of Brampton and Marolyn Morrison of Caledon were selected.

Frank McKechnie and Maja Prentice were reappointed to the Metro Toronto Conservation Authority while Pat Saito retained her seat on the Credit Valley Hospital Board.

Serving on the Peel Children's Aid Society will be Culham and Mahoney of Mississauga, Lorna Bissell of Brampton and Pierre Klein of Caledon.

Culham was also appointed to the Peel Museum Board.

Eighteen councillors, including Peel Chair Emil Kolb and incumbent Chair Maja Prentice were renamed to the board of Peel Living, which administers non-profit housing in the Region.
