He ran into trouble with the regulators of the Ontario Securities Commission in the mid-1980s when the OSC launched a civil suit alleging McLaughlin siphoned \$35 million from his company for personal use.

At one point he was forced by his board of directors to resign from the company he founded.

McLaughlin denied the allegations and fought the case through the courts for 24 years.

The OSC finally dropped the action in 2010.

The avid outdoorsman and golfer died July 23, 2012.
