Rosemary's daughter torn between 'reality and fiction'

Amy Taylor fold a criminal court jury yesterday she may have given false statements to police nearly two years ago to get herself off the hook.

That admission was part of the conflicting testimony jury members heard from the daughter of a public school trustee facing conspiracy charges.

Amy Taylor, 21, testified in Ontario Court, general division, she may have unintentionally misled police because she was under stress and she wanted to

keep herself out of trouble.

Her mother, Rosemary Taylor, came to court last week to face allegations that she put up a phantom candidate during the Nov., 1994 municipal elec-tion, in an effort to take votes away from a rival candidate.

In a video statement made to police following the election in Nov., 1994, and shown to the 12-member jury vesterday, Amy Taylor told Peel Regional Police Sergeant Bruce Chapman her mother was afraid of losing the Peel Board of Education Ward 6 trustee race to George Carlson, a former trustee, and subsequently sought out a person to be listed as a candidate at the top of the

Amy Taylor's boyfriend, David Buchanan Hunter, 22, agreed to be that person, she said in her statement to police, and entered himself in the race as David Buchanan, at Rosemary

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However, yesterday, Amy Taylor testified those statements — made to police in Nov., 1994, and at a preliminary inquiry under oath in Jan., 1996 —

vere not true.
"My statements might not have been true because I was under a lot of stress, and in a state of shock. I didn't know the difference between reality and fiction then, nor do I now," Amy Taylor told a jury in Brampton court. "I didn't intentionally lie to Sergeant Chapman. I thought if I told him what he wanted to hear, he'd let me go. I knew subconsciously what he wanted to hear. I didn't intend to lie."

Amy Taylor also told court yesterday that it was Hunter's idea, and his alone, to enter the race, and that he had said it might be "fun." Further, she testified she believed her boyfriend was doing nothing wrong by entering the race under the name Buchanan, and that her mother hadn't put him up to it at

Amy Taylor also said that Hunter eventually wanted out of the race, due

Coke ring busted up by RCMP

A raid on a Mississauga house yester-day helped to conclude an eight-month investigation into an international cocaine ring.

Milton detachment Royal Canadian Mounted Police simultaneously exercised 10 different search warrants in Brampton, Mississauga and Etobicoke yesterday. The investigation has involved Canada Customs officials and police in Halifax, Guyana and St. Lucia.

Seized from the Mississauga house were two loaded firearms, two kilo-grams of crack cocaine, two kilograms of cannabis resin and about five pounds

of marijuana.

The RCMP says the cocaine originated in Guyana and was shipped to • See Courier page 5

Shot twice man lives to tell tale

A Scarborough man who was shot recently in Malton suffered a gunshot wound in the same neighborhood just over a month ago,
Peel Regional Police say the victim, a

21-year-old male, was walking along Morning Star Dr., near Goreway Dr., about 1:45 p.m. September 13 when two men standing near Westwood Secondary School called to him by name, and warned him to stay out of Malton.

The two men followed the victim on foot to a townhouse complex at 7555 Goreway Dr., and one of the culprits pulled a handgun and fired shots into


the air, police say.

The suspects then approached the victim and one of them shot him in the cheek, and a second shot hit the victim in the shoulder and continued on into his head, police say. The victim was brought to Etobicoke General Hospital, and treat-

ed for non-life threatening injuries.

The victim also had a gunshot wound from a previous shooting at a Malton house party in late July, police say.

A Mississauga man has been charged in connection with the July shooting. Geoffrey Paul Beckford, 18, has been charged with attempted murder, aggravated assault and weapons dangerous

• Continued from page 1 to the publicity surrounding the election. Citing several inconsistencies between Amy's testimony yesterday and testimony given by her at the preliminary inquiry in January, Peel assistant crown attorney Steve Sherriff wrapped up the crown's case

Defence attorney Michael Czuma said he will not present a case for the defence. Madam Justice Moira Caswell told the jury she would address them today, and that the case would be in their hands by tomorrow morning, after both sides

deliver their summations.

Rosemary Taylor, 44, in her third term as a trustee, has pleaded not guilty to charges of conspiracy to utter forged documents and conspiracy to commit fraud.

The charges stem from a complaint filed by the City of Mississauga's Clerk's Department over the legitimacy of Hunter's candidacy in the Nov., 1994 race.

Court has heard that a police investigation immediately following the elec-tion revealed that a fictitious candidate named David Buchanan was added to the ballot to take away votes from Carlson. Taylor defeated Carlson by 23 votes in the bitter race. Buchanan received 415 votes.

The police investigation at the time found there never was a David Buchanan and that Hinter was posing as Buchanan the top of the alphabetically arranged ballot, just ahead of Carlson.

The theory is that uninformed voters often choose the top name on the ballot, giving that candidate an extra three or four per cent of the votes.

Yesterday morning, Katia Honsa, 21, told the court that as a favor to her long-time friend, Amy Taylor, she signed Buchanan's nomination form in Oct., 1994. Further, she testified that Amy Taylor told her Buchanan's candidacy was an effort by Rosemary Taylor to have someone placed ahead of Carlson's name on the ballot.

Last week, Hunter told the court Rosemary Taylor persuaded him to enter the race in order to take votes away from the other candidates.

Carlson testified Monday he became

suspicious of Buchanan's candidacy after discovering the signatures on his nomination form belonged to family and

friends of Rosemary Taylor.
"I felt it was a case of monkey business in local politics, and that Mrs. Taylor was behind it," Carlson testified.

Meanwhile, Amy Taylor is facing charges of conspiracy to utter a forged document. She was also arrested by police immediately after testifying yesterday, for failing to appear in Brampton court Monday, where she was to answer to the conspiracy charge.
