"He said when the sun shines on


you, smile," said Tomiuk in delivering her acceptance speech at the 2012 Civic Awards yesterday afternoon in the Civic Centre's Great Hall.

The grassroots activist, best known as the voice of MIRANET (Mississauga Residents' Associations Network), said she's had a lot of help along the way, particularly from mentors (and past Gordon S. Shipp Memorial Award winners) such as Ward I Councillor Jim Tovey and Hugh Stewart. She also credits Janis Alton, who started the community group, the Port Credit Village Project.

"I know how to be a positive, productive citizen thanks to them," Tomiuk said, adding she's part of a group of citizens dedicated to making Mississauga the best city in which to

live and raise a family.

Tomiuk, who's also involved with the Mississauga Cycling Advisory Committee and Town of Port Ctedit Association, said it's energizing and inspiring knowing people who can work collectively, in a positive and constructive manner, "with the City and other levels of the government to promote the inter-

ests of Mississauga residents and contribute to the city's success."

Tomiuk also thanked her family for being there for her time and again.

She said she doesn't take winning the award
