

JUNXION FROM CINEPLEX SET TO DEBUT AT ERIN MILLS TOWN CENTRE

MOVIE THEATRES, DINING HALL AND BAR, GAMES AND ENTERTAINMENT WILL BE HOUSED IN ONE COMPOUND

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Mississauga's Erin Mills Town Centre will soon be home to a first-of-its-kind entertainment compound.

On Nov. 27, Cineplex Canada announced plans for its first-ever all-in-one entertainment destination.

The concept, Junxion, will be a mash-up of dining, movie-going and various other entertainment and game experiences, constructed and debuted at the city's Erin Mills Town Cen-

tre.

The 45,000-square-foot facility will take over what used to be a Sears, which closed in 2018.

Junxion will feature six auditoriums, a stage for live music, a food hall equipped with indoor food truck area and bar, and a rooftop patio.

Residents will be able to experience VR studios, outdoor movie screenings and live TV events.

"Junxion is where Cineplex's famous movie-going experience meets our innovative entertainment offerings. It will bring together the best of both worlds and provide guests with an unforgettable and unmatched social experience," Ellis Jacob, president and CEO, Cineplex, said in a news release.

Building and developing with Cushman & Wakefield, the new development

is part of Erin Mill's ongoing redevelopment plan, which saw major construction in 2014.

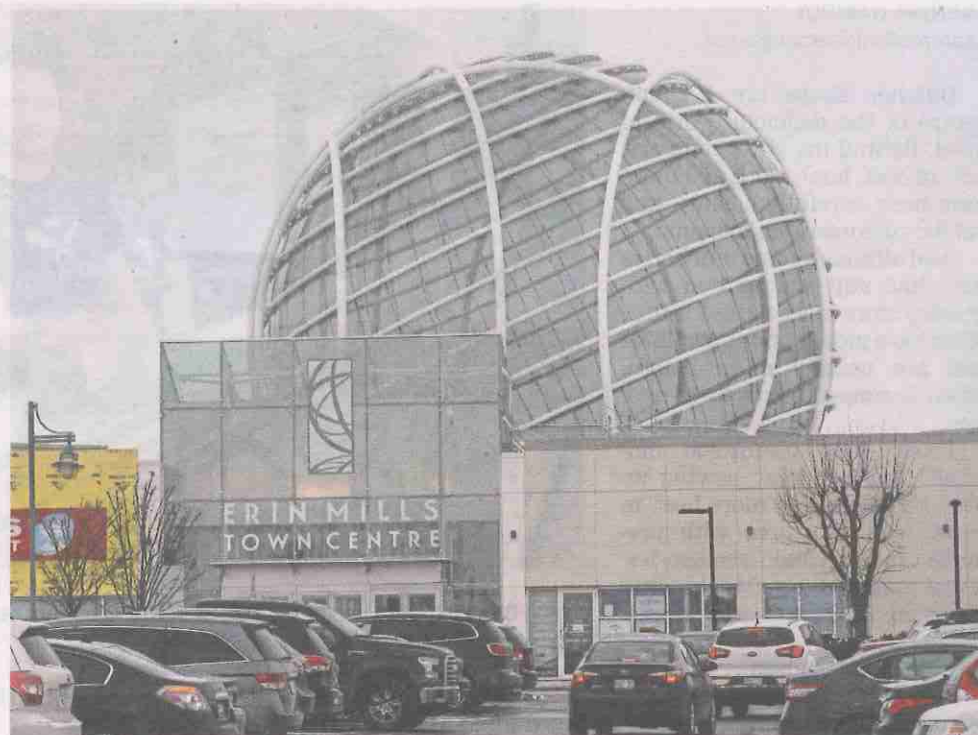
The announcement comes months after Ward 9 Coun. Pat Saito hinted that the city could be seeing a new movie theatre soon.

Junxion is set to open in late 2020.

"As Canada's entertainment landscape continues to evolve, we are proudly introducing this state-of-the-art community hub where families and friends can come together to play, dine, unwind and have fun," said Jacob.

council so the city can still have up to 12 votes in the event a councillor is absent.
With city and Peel Council. Sue McFadden planning on taking a medical leave in the new year, Mississauga's representation at the region could be at 11 votes until the spring.
Community safety
Citing an uptick in vio-

lent crime as well as less funding for additional police officers, Crombie said Mississauga will host another community safety summit.
"I want to ensure that we have an understanding of what the risks are in our city and what is being done to mitigate those risks," she said.
Crombie also said she

want to ensure police feel they have the resources they need "adequately do their jobs."
Mississauga previously had a community safety summit in 2018.
In December, Peel police Chief Nishan Duraiappah said that the 35 officers funded in the 2020 budget would bring the force to a "breathing point" for ser-

vice delivery.
Transit
In 2020, Crombie said she'll continue to advocate for two-way, all-day service on the Milton GO train line.
Though it would be a "longer-term project" involving the federal and provincial governments building more freight rail capacity, the mayor said the initiative would be

"transformative for Mississauga, should it happen."
Currently the train line runs east into Toronto in the morning, and west out of Union Station in the afternoon, primarily catering to commuters leaving Milton and Mississauga.
Crombie said the city needs train service more reflective of the needs of commuters travelling to work in Mississauga.
"That train - and I like to say this because people get it right away - it travels in the wrong direction," she said.
GO buses run from Union Station to Mississauga along the Milton Line weekday mornings and afternoons.
Affordable housing
Crombie said affordable housing stock is "always on our wish list," and Mississauga is working with the provincial government "to ensure that we can impose things like inclusionary zoning on new developments."

Inclusionary zoning, a policy that can require a certain number of affordable units in new residential developments, was limited to projects in major transit areas in Ontario's Bill 108.
According to a Mississauga news release, less than 10 per cent of city-approved residential units have been built.

CITY TO CONTINUE TO SEEK PEEL REGION REFORMS

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The Mississauga News recently interviewed Mayor Bonnie Crombie to see what her priorities are for the city in 2020. Here's what she said.

Changes at Peel Region
Crombie outlined several issues with Peel Region she said are "unfair to Mississauga residents and taxpayers," including how the police are funded.

Under the current model, which is based on property value assessments, Brampton pays around 36.9 per cent while Mississauga pays 63.1 per cent of the Peel regional police budget.

Mississauga has proposed to fund Peel police with an Ontario Provincial Police model and estimates a \$69 million savings if adopted. Brampton Mayor Patrick Brown has said the model wouldn't work in Peel.

Crombie also said she wants Mississauga to have a weighted vote at Peel
