### **Celebrating Peel's 150th** Which is older – Peel or Canada?

#### Did you know?

#### The Region of Peel is older than Canada? We're both celebrating our 150<sup>th</sup> anniversaries this year, but Peel was born six months earlier than Canada.

Our regional government actually began 16 years earlier – in 1851 – when the United Counties of York, Ontario, and Peel were created. Ontario County – which is now much of Durham Region – separated three years later and Peel also began to explore if it could become its own county.

Before it could, Peel had to build a courthouse with a council chamber and

jail and a majority of Peel voters had to agree to the separation. On January 1, 1867, the independent County of Peel was born. The courthouse and jail were also opened in 1867.

Peel County lasted for another 107 years before it was dissolved and replaced by the Regional Municipality of Peel in 1974. Today, Peel is still carrying on its 150-year tradition of being an independent, upper tier municipality.

# We still use Peel County's 150-year old courthouse and jail?

Today, the courthouse and jail are home to the Peel Art Gallery, Museum and Archives (PAMA), which also includes



the registry office, built in 1890, and the county office building, built in 1959.

#### 2017 Regional Budget

The Region of Peel's annual budget outlines how tax dollars and utility fees will be invested to help provide the services we value, such as the operations and maintenance of transportation systems, waste and water services and police services.

The 2017 Budget includes a property tax increase of 0.9 percent. The average residential property and small business will see an increase in their property tax bill of \$42 and \$73 respectively. Additionally, the average


home will see a \$29 increase to their utility bill, while the average small business will see an increase of \$76.

Along with meeting the Capital and Operating needs of the Region, the budget provides funding to the three local conservation authorities (Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Halton Conservation Authority and Toronto and Region Conservation Authority), Peel Regional Police and the Ontario Provincial Police.


### TransHelp's New Website and Online Eligibility Application

Transhelp has expanded its transportation service to be compliant with the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA). As of January 2017, TransHelp now accepts applications from individuals living in the Region of Peel who have a physical, cognitive, visual, sensory or mental health disability and who experience barriers to using conventional public transportation services some or all of the time.

The Region of Peel has launched a new website that will support Peel residents in learning about, applying for and riding TransHelp.

The website is designed to better serve potential applicants to TransHelp through supportive and transcribed videos, an online form (or PDF application), and up-to-date user information for passengers, all in a mobile-friendly and accessible format. Applicants can continue to contact the Region of Peel at any time to request alternate formats.

GrownInPeel.ca features an interactive map, which lists events happening at your local farms and farmers markets and provides the seasonal availability of nearly 50 fruits and vegetables.

## **Important Information about Household Medical Waste**

Please remember that household medical waste supplies are not recyclable and must be placed in the garbage. Items such as casts, catheters, IV bags and tubing, incontinence products, etc., should be double-bagged and disposed of in the garbage.

Sharps, including needles and syringes, are also not recyclable. They should be placed in biohazard containers and taken to one of Peel's Community Recycling Centres (CRC) or to a pharmacy for disposal. Biohazard containers are available free at Peel's CRCs.

Let's all do our part to put household medical waste where it belongs.

### **Peel Thanks Residents for Recycling**

The Region of Peel would like to thank residents for helping us divert one million tonnes of recyclable material from landfills over the last decade.

"Thank you for participating in our recycling program," says Norm Lee, Peel's Director of Waste Management. "Because you chose to put recyclable materials in your blue box instead of in the garbage, we've achieved some great environmental and economic outcomes."

Peel's Material Recovery Facility (MRF), in Brampton, reached this major milestone in mid-December 2016, when it diverted one million tonnes of recyclables from landfills since it opened in 2005.

Collecting and recycling material uses far less energy than extracting raw resources. It also leaves raw resources for future generations. By recycling one million tonnes, we saved:

- 3 million tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions,
- 15 million trees,
- 18 million gigajoules of energy which equals 500 million litres of gasoline, and





Recycling material also generates more economic activity and creates more jobs than disposing of material. By recycling one million tonnes, we:

- generated \$115 million in total revenue for Peel,
- created 73 full-time equivalent jobs, and
- invested over \$25 million in local infrastructure.

"Thanks for your commitment," says Lee to Peel residents. "We're looking forward to your continued support as we work toward 75% diversion from landfill."

## Peel Region Lobbyist Registry **Now Live**

As part of Regional Council's commitment to enhance accountability and transparency, all Lobbyists must now register online prior to or within five days of lobbying a Region of Peel Public Office Holder. All Regional Councillors and Regional staff are Public Office Holders. Registration is a simple process and must occur before or within five business days of lobbying commencing.

The Lobbyist Registry allows the public to access a record of lobbying activity that occurs with Regional Public Office Holders.

#### What is Lobbying?

Lobbying is any communication with a Public Office Holder by an individual who is paid or represents a business or financial interest with the goal of trying to influence any legislative action. These actions include:

- Development, introduction, passage, defeat, amendment or repeal of a by-law, motion or resolution
- Development, approval, amendment, application or termination of a Regional policy, program, directive or quideline
- Outcome of a decision on any matter before Council, a Committee of Council or a Councillor or staff member acting under delegated authority

### **Road Safety Strategic Plan Being Developed**



The Region of Peel's population continues to grow and is currently the second highest in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area. The significant increase in population has resulted in heightened demand on the Region's transportation network. To prepare, the Region of Peel is currently developing a long term road safety strategic plan (RSSP) with partnership from various stakeholders.

The RSSP will set out the goals, objectives, and action plans to guide the Region and its road safety partners towards creating safer roads and reducing the number of collisions, serious injuries and road fatalities. Eliminating fatalities and serious injuries is a shared responsibility between road users and those who design and maintain and enforce our roadways.

Through collision analysis and extensive public opinion consultation, the RSSP has determined six areas the Region will target:

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- 1. Intersection related collisions
- 2. Aggressive driving
- 3. Distracted driving
- **4**. Pedestrian collisions
- 5. Cyclist collisions
- 6. Impaired driving

Public consultations identified school zones and heavy trucks as concerns that need additional awareness. The actions developed will have a positive impact on these areas.

The next step is to identify actions to improve safety for each of the areas, through activities such as engineering modification, enforcement, and education.

We hope to begin implementing the RSSP plan in 2018.
