

The Living Green Master Plan was completed in 2011 and adopted by Council on January 18, 2012. The Living Green Master Plan identifies priorities and organizes actions to move the City towards environmental sustainability.

The City began its streetlight LED conversion project with the installation of a monitoring system that detects malfunctioning street lights multiple times a day and transmits this information wirelessly. This will be followed by the replacement of the light portion of 49,000 streetlights from the old high pressure sodium lights to LED. The conversion will continue until December 2014. The \$26M investment should result in a 55% reduction in future energy consumption and significant reduction in maintenance costs for street lighting. LED street lighting uses less energy, reduces harmful gas emissions and reduces sky glow because of a more even distribution of white light. LED lights were also installed in tennis courts located in three tennis clubs of the City and adopted as the future standard for tennis court lighting.

The Garry Morden Centre was built to very high standards of sustainability targeting LEED Silver rating.

Fire Station 116 on Tomken Road was built with geothermal heating and was awarded the prestigious "High Performance New Construction" certificate given to new buildings with highly sustainable design features by Enbridge.

The Energy Benchmarking, Energy Awareness and Retro-Commissioning (EBEAR) Program was accepted by the Environmental Advisory Committee. The Program aims to improve energy efficient operation and maintenance practices of City facilities as well as build awareness for the campaign. It is aimed at having facility users and staff take ownership of their energy use behaviour and their role in

Expand the City's purchase of green energy.
