We serve to present an exceptional collection of historic house museums with the goal to create a meaningful dialogue on a shared past, a collective present and a collaborative future. By presenting relevant exhibitions, educational programs and innovative engagement experiences, the museums connect the public with the story of Mississauga's heritage shaped by Canadian identity and our global context.

The exhibition Morris Lum Within at the Anchorage / Bradley Museums generated great interest and feedback from across Mississauga. The exhibition dovetails with the concepts of Living Heritage at the Museums, as well as highlights the immigrant experience at this time in the city.

The exhibition included a partnership with Scotia Bank Contact Photographic Festival. The exhibition was on display from May 1st to September 14th. The Opening VIP night on May 5th featured a memorable evening of live music by Unchained.

About Morris Lum

Born in Trinidad and Tobago, Morris Lum is a first-generation Canadian practitioner and academic working in photography. His recent series is an examination of social spaces and the Chinese diaspora in the suburbs of the Greater Toronto Area. Exploring his own identity from a unique perspective, Lum's intent is to better understand the hybrid definitions of social space and the ways that class, identity and belonging carve patterns and shape beliefs for his community. The work entails an immersive photographic installation with artifacts is situated in a Heritage House reminding us of Lum's ongoing research with recycled suburban architecture, diasporic spaces and silence of the immigrant voice.

A featured, curated exhibition with catalogue text by Curator, Stuart Keeler in a free full colour catalogue available to viewers across the GTA and the exhibition site. Over 25,000 catalogues produced by CONTACT

Friends of the Museums purchased a work by Morris Lum for the Artifact Collection at the Museums of Mississauga for \$1,200.

Onsite Programming: Friends of Museums and MOMAC night at the Museum with special community guests and open to the public.

Exhibition Concept:

Lum photographs sites that are devoid of the people who would normally occupy them. His current exploration involves the interiors of places of worship in the suburbs; documenting both commanding churches and make-shift spaces utilized for prayer and gatherings with a

straightforward observational nature, while probing and provoking our questions and thoughts. Absent from the presentation, however important to the work the artist seemingly skirting the edges of social practice; the artist creates relationships with the occupants and entails a complex permissioning based upon trust, respect and belonging. The images reveal temporary decorations and objects and in some cases there are no clues that any one demographic calls these places "my church." Perhaps these spaces of belonging are the extremity of their function and they are, instead of the depicted hollow vessels, mirrors for the complexity and racialization of the suburban diaspora.

7.2 - 4

This work could be described as a laissez-faire study of liturgical interiors and the ways we are programmed to think when interacting with these spaces. Toronto, often touted as the most multicultural city in the world, has pushed many of its inhabitants to the margins of the suburban landscapes that ring the edges. The philosopher Yi-Fu Tuan explains, "Human geography's optimism lies in its belief that asymmetrical relationships and exploitation can be removed, or reversed."

Death Becomes Us

Name of program/event: Death Becomes Us: Expressions of Loss and Mourning Date of program/event exhibition: September 24 – November 20th Exhibition Opening: October 13 2016

Description of exhibition

Responding to the diversity of our sites, the museum has created an assemblage of varied exhibitions on the subject of loss and mourning/expression of loss from contemporary rituals

and customs to Victorian interpretations. Exhibitions include: a community engagement piece about cultural practices surrounding loss and mourning, a historical re-enactment in a Victorian home on the death of a patriarch, a public art installation which asks the community to contemplate and share their 'bucket list', and an investigation of popular culture representations of gothic horror stories feared and adored by the Victorians. In addition, there are multiple public programs associated with these exhibitions to cater to different audiences.

7.2 - 6

In our lifetime, we seek to postpone death, we are addicted to health, exercise, Botox and fear of getting older. The Victorians, instead of fearing the process of dying and the corpse, felt reverence and embraced the passage of life.

All around the world death and mourning rituals are perceived and practiced differently by diverse cultures and religions. Mississauga is a microcosm of the world's culture and traditions. With our participatory exhibition we seek to reflect the enormous diversity of our community and the multiple ways we grieve and cope with loss and suffering.

Exhibits:

The museums will explore different religious beliefs surrounding death & dying. We discover first hand through storytelling the rituals and customs of Mississauga community member. Question to explore: what are the cultural rituals for coping with dying, the deceased person's body, the final arrangements for the body and honoring the death? Ex. Jewish people cut a tie and sit shiva Ex. Some aboriginal groups smudge and self-flagellate Ex. Filipinos go to the cemetery and play cards – one weekend a year

Exhibition Text:

While the end of life experience is universal, the behaviors associated with expressing grief and the procedure of mourning are very much culturally bound. Working with community groups and select individuals across Mississauga, we explore rituals and customs of varied cultural groups through storytelling and collections on loan from participants.

The Museums of Mississauga will lead a conversation about connecting with new and diverse audiences, embracing guest authority on subject matter, and sharing the platform of exhibitions with community members. The exhibition we will use as a backdrop is "Death Becomes Us' at the Anchorage, Bradley Museum; a participatory exhibition co-curated by Marnie Mandel and 12 engaged citizens who worked together to inspire one another's independent projects on grieving the passing of a loved one.

12 people will be selected to work on the participatory engagement project. All individuals will create vignettes that respond to their personal experiences on the losing of a loved one. The vignettes can display videos, letters, pictures, etc. By working together we will inspire one another's independent projects and foster an environment of healing.

Location: Benares Historic House

Death Becomes Him: A Historical Re-enactment on the Death of the Captain Concept:

Transforming the house to experience the loss and suffering over the death of the patriarch Captain James Beveridge Harris in 1884.. Walk through the house after the funeral procession, or take part in the funeral procession. Including rarely exhibited items of Harris family mourning dress and accessories from the Museums collection.

Exhibition Draft Text:

Step back in time to 1884, when family patriarch Captain Harris died at home. Poignant scenes of death and grief recreated in the House will explore mid-19th century mourning customs. Pay your last respects at his deathbed upstairs, or join the mourning in the double parlor, hung with black crepe curtains and set for a mid-19th century funeral. Also on exhibit, Harris family photographs and mourning attire and accessories, including jewelry made of hair and jet.

7.2 - 8

Location: Benares Visitor Centre

Concept:

The horror genre has been frightening audiences for over 100 years. The first depictions of supernatural events appear in several of the silent shorts created by the film pioneer Georges Méliès in the late 1890s, Most would say the first horror film ever made was "Le Manoir du Diable" or "The House of the Devil" which was filmed by Georges Melies of France in 1896. The film runs about 3 minutes and was completely silent. It is a mess of fun camera tricks including skeletons that appear out of thin air and a bat that turns into a man. Not to mention a lot of stabbing people in the bottom with wooden pitchforks.

Location: Barn at Bradley

Bradley Museum will celebrate its 50th anniversary in June, 2017. Originally opened as a Centennial Project in 1967, the Museums will recognize the contribution of volunteers who helped create, fund and support the Bradley Museum through a display of artifacts and images from its opening. A volunteer appreciation event will recreate the original opening and celebrate their on-going support and dedication to the Museums of Mississauga.

The Story of M(ississauga) THOM (Thematic Heritage Outline of Mississauga)

Dates: In progress throughout 2017

The key recommendation in the Heritage Strategic Plan underlies the entire plan is the creation of a Thematic Heritage Outline of Mississauga (THOM), now called the Story of M.

The area now known as Mississauga has a plethora of stories but, little more than the pioneer settler European version has made it into our history books. The City needs to understand the entire story, from our early glacial and indigenous roots to our present day diversity to begin creating meaningful relationships with our residents. The THOM will be heavily resident informed and rely upon community input in all phases of its development. Once we understand all of the stories and which ones are important to the community at large, we will then know where to direct our efforts. Once established, the THOM will set the priorities for all City initiatives with a heritage component within the context of the City's Strategic Plan.

A series of Focus Groups, Storytelling workshops and marketing related incentives will be conducted in all Wards of the City throughout 2017.

The THOM will guide the Museums artifact collection, programming, interpretation, heritage designation priorities and more. As such, the THOM will help ensure that City heritage related efforts are meaningful to its constituents and has the potential to be a unifying factor as well as innovative.

Concurrent with Exhibition:

Aboriginal Symposium

The Conversation Series at Noel Ryan Auditorium aims to engage a centrally based audience with thoughtful discussion, storytelling, learning and the presentation of modern traditions and views. In collaboration with PAN guest speakers, and through partnership with other institutions, panels and discussions will attempt to open up a city-wide conversation. How do the physical spaces we inhabit inform or respond to the Aboriginal activities performed within them? What are the approaches we can take to indigenize community understanding? Through an ongoing questioning of these themes, explored through both radical and practical propositions for our institution's future, the series goal is to arrive at a collective and forward-thinking approach to the concepts of place and sharing.

The Museums of Mississauga and the Peel Aboriginal Network have joined together in the creation of an exploration and presentation of First Nation heritage narratives and traditions within the story of Mississauga. Four public event series will investigate, acknowledge and connect residents in meaningful ways to the traditions, stories and histories of the First Nation people. The project will heighten the recognition and the importance of place and sharing in all of our lives within the lens of Living Heritage and history of the Peel Region with and Mississauga.

Colonialism Symposium Canada 150

Language Forthcoming | occurs as end result of AIR Project with Turner and Devine Collaboration with AGM, UTM, Sheridan, UT

Who writes the history of Canada? The relationship between colonial structures and the contemporary frameworks of "heritage" in Canada deserves to be discussed, presented, debated and unraveled. How does the term "heritage" begin to create a new story or the retelling of a national narrative? Does "heritage" imply a particular viewpoint of colonialism? How do heritage thinkers, all of whom are engaged in various different and abstract new ways with preservation, heritage practices all translating the past. How is the past told – when particular stories and truths are omitted, erased or others tell the story? The goal of this symposium is to open a dialogue with the heritage house sectre as a backdrop for inspiration and inclusion.

Heritage in Canada is closely united through colonial frameworks – in itself part of the chequered and contested history of globalised ideas of heritage, and colonial authorities often found themselves having to stave off the invasion of global heritage thinking, often by resorting to the argument of specificity of local practice and storytelling from one perspective and voice. How do we re-frame the histories of heritage sites in such a way as to serve the interests of heritage groups, people outside the lens of colonialism or often not included in the story of "canadian heritage"? The ultimate goal is to emphasize the guardianship role of colonial rule in preserving the cultural heritage, history and the social fabric of the colonies in order to provide legitimation for colonialism.

The aim of the symposium is to understand colonial practices of rewriting the past of colonised societies and heritage-making on the interface of the global and the local. Some of the questions that will be addressed are:

7.3 - 8

How did colonial systems position themselves between the global and the local? How malleable were these categories? What kind of dialogue emerged between the local and the global in defining heritage and its practice in colonial contexts?

The symposium will seek to address these questions by examining colonial structures in a comparative context, by trying to problematize, open up and decentre the connections in debates on colonial heritage and by looking at the postcolonial implications of colonial heritage thinking that has been captured between the global and the local.

<u>Events</u>

Aboriginal people have lived along the shores of Lake Ontario for over 10,000 years. Evidence of Paleo-Indian, Archaic, Woodland and Iroquoian is primarily archaeological. Between 1650 and 1720 the Mississaugas, an Ojibwa tribe establish themselves in Southern Ontario, including along the Credit River in what is now Mississauga. It is known that several First Nations called this region home, Anishinaabe, Haudenosaunee and Huron-Wendat people. The First Nations people living in and final keepers of the land are the Mississauga of the New Credit. In the language of the Mississauga people, the Credit River community called themselves Anishinaabe – or "human beings". There is a word in the language "Missisakis" meaning "many river mouths"
