**Discrimination** - when a person is treated unfairly due to a part of their identity


Racism - when people are treated unfairly because of the colour of their skin or their culture

Think about what your hair looks like... Draw your hair on the blank face below!






#### **CELEBRITY STYLES**

Draw a line to match the celebrity to the hairstyle they were known for wearing! Find the answers in the exhibition.




#### DOG OR 'DO?!

Some people have hair routines with many steps.



# HAIR AROUND THE WORLD

An **Anishinaabe** teaching states that hair is only cut during times of mourning and grief.

In Guangxi, women from the **Yao** community cut their hair once in their lives—on their 18th birthday!



The **Navajo people** wear their long hair in a bun called a **tsiiyéél**. The hair is tied with white sheep wool string.


**Himba** women use a paste called **otjize**. This makes their hair red, which symbolizes life and earth.
